We are looking forward to working with you on even more facets of our industry.


I recently attended the Construction Materials Industry Conference 2018 in Sydney. This was a very full-on two and a half days of plenary sessions and presentations and was capped-off with a business leaders panel discussion on the Friday afternoon. The issues being faced by the greater Sydney area planners and businesses are not all that dissimilar to our own albeit everything is on a much larger scale. Forecast population growth and infrastructure requirements are being constantly revised with the NSW Government now looking at spending over \$100 billion on infrastructure in the greater Sydney area over the next two decades. Population growth of nearly two million people over the next eighteen years will put huge pressure on an already committed concrete and aggregate supply industry. Pushing quarries and related industries further away from the areas of need just puts more pressure on transport infrastructure and project costs.



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These issues equally apply on this side of the Tasman and can be a significant barrier to development particularly if the public is against you before you even start.

You may recall my comments in the previous newsletter regarding our image as in industry ....” We need to improve our image in the eyes of the public and promote quarrying as an essential element in maintaining a progressive society for ourselves and our children.

The IOQNZ Executive has discussed this image issue that we have on many occasions and there is no one silver bullet answer. If you have any suggestions about how we can start to improve our image, please email me with your thoughts.”

At the end of the International Presidents Panel Discussion in Hamilton, Steve Davis asked if we each had one wish/goal for the quarry industry, what would it be? I replied ... to have a positive public image in the community. Looking forward to your contribution.

Sponsorship and support from various members/companies is hugely appreciated, certainly making the organising of events far easier, and we encourage you to show your support for these members.



## Central Districts Branch Report




We are holding our AGM and Branch Technical meeting in Palmerston North on Saturday 29 September 2018 from 12 pm. Speakers include:





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## MinEx Update




Our regional workshops, designed to make it easier for you to comprehend, develop and implement good, simple health and safety management systems, have been a success across the country with 285 having attended the 12 workshops held thus far. These 3-hour free sessions are also planned for the following locations:

- Paeroa - 16 Oct
- Te Kuiti - 17 Oct
- Stratford - 18 Oct
- Kerikeri - 24 Oct
- Dargaville - 25 Oct
- Sth Auckland - 13 Nov

We are now receiving incident data and reports from a larger number of sites. This positive response will ensure future quarterly data will provide us with more robust information from a larger cross section of the sector.

This pie chart shows the spread of incidents and near misses, by category, for the 12 months to July 2018. We will be developing programmes and literature to support quarries in the elimination of these incidents.



We would like to thank those of you who have shared their data and incidents with us.



Due to resourcing constraints, MBIE have advised that the Mining Regulations review will be delayed by 3 months. This is likely to mean that revised Regulations will not be in place until mid-2019. On behalf of the sector, we have made submissions to MBIE on the regulations which helped inform the consultation document currently being considered. Submissions now close 28 September 2018.

An expression of interest has been issued for those wishing to enrol in a trial group of apprentices in Mining and Quarrying. Apprentices will complete Certificate II units in 2018 and enrol in Certificate IV in Mining and Quarrying from early 2019. Training will be a blend of classroom, e-learning and on-the-job training and assessment. We have had an excellent response with 32 expressions of interest, of which 31 are from the quarry sector. These applicants have commenced pre-enrolment, and we are currently working with MITO to develop learning programmes for delivery of Certificate IV training.

I am working with MITO to establish a sustainable model for training delivery going forward.

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## MITO Update



**1. Training update.** Initial scoping and development work for a programme leading to the New Zealand Certificate in Mining and Quarrying (First-line Supervision) (Level 4) with a strand in Surface is underway. This programme will form part of an apprenticeship pathway for learners, who would first complete the New Zealand Certificate in Mining and Quarrying (Level 2) qualification. The Level 2 is an existing programme that MITO is redeveloping for online tutorial-based delivery. This will include online theory assessment and practical assessment tasks carried out in the workplace with supervisor verification. It is anticipated that a cohort of learners will start the Level 2 programme during October 2018. An Extractives Reference Group, specifically formed to provide subject matter expertise, will meet with MITO early October to confirm the unit standard content of the Level 4 Surface strand. This programme will include the unit standard requirements for the new site specific CoC.

**2. 2019 MITO scholarships.** MITO invites applications from the extractives industry for 2019 scholarships in the following categories:

- **KickStart** – available to fulltime employees, or those with an offer of fulltime employment, in one of MITO's industries in 2019 who have not previously been enrolled in a MITO training programme at Level 4 or above. Up to 25 scholarships available, paying the first year fees for any MITO New Zealand apprenticeship or traineeship programme at Level 4 or above.
- **KickStart Māori and Pasifika** - available to fulltime employees, or those with an offer of fulltime employment, in one of MITO's industries in 2019 who have not previously been enrolled in a MITO training programme at Level 4 or above; who are of Māori or Pasifika ethnicity. Up to seven scholarships available, paying the first year fees for any MITO New Zealand apprenticeship or traineeship programme at Level 4 or above.
- **Business Skills** – available to current or aspiring managers or supervisors in one of MITO's industries. Up to 15 scholarships available, paying the programme fee for the New Zealand Certificate in Business (First Line Management) (Level 4).
- **Business Skills Māori and Pasifika** - available to current or aspiring managers or supervisors in one of MITO's industries; who are of Māori or Pasifika ethnicity. Up to 15 scholarships available, paying the programme fee for the New Zealand Certificate in Business (First Line Management) (Level 4).
- **MITO Alumni** – available to anyone that has already completed a qualification at Level 4 or above through MITO and wishes to continue their studies while working. This scholarship contributes up to \$2,000 towards any programme of study related to their industry (either through MITO or another provider including universities).

Applications are now open and close on Friday 14 December, with the successful candidates advised by the end of January 2019. Apply online: <https://www.mito.org.nz/news/apply-for-a-2019-mito-scholarship/>.

**3. Promotion Activities: Online job brokering:** MITO has developed a jobseekers' online profile service for employers to view, including the roles each jobseeker is interested in, locations, CV etc. Only employers in the industries that MITO supports are able to register and view the jobseekers. The job brokering service will be available on the MITO website shortly and supports the Find a Job/List a Job function on the MITO website, whereby employers are able to list their job vacancies for free, with entry-level roles promoted by MITO via Facebook.

**A career in the Quarry industry profile:** MITO will soon release a video and written profile on Winstone Aggregates – Belmont Quarry for online marketing and trade publications to raise awareness of careers in the quarrying sector.


### Southern Screenworks wins top Environmental Award

## Mining Board of Examiners WORKSAFE

### Do you have CPD feedback?

Continual Professional Development (CPD) for Certificate of Competence (CoC) holders has now been in place for three years.

The Board is assessing how CPD is working three years on and is seeking industry feedback. Interested parties are asked to submit answers to the following questions by 5 October.

1. Do you understand the CPD requirements?
2. How do you find completing the CPD requirements?
3. How easy do you find it to record your CPD and provide evidence?

### Assessment of logbooks

CoC applications submitted before 1 August this year will be assessed against the requirements set out in the Gazette that were current until 1 August, when the amended Gazette notice took effect.

However, applications sent after 1 August will be assessed against the amended Gazette notice (published 1 August.)

This ensures fairness to applicants.

### Incomplete applications

Note that CoC applications returned before 1 August will now need to meet new requirements as per the amended Gazette notice. This is because they are treated as new applications. As of 1 August:

- first aid certificates must include first aid unit standards 6400, 6401 and 6402 (an updated NZQA record of achievement to show these unit standards)
- operational experience requirements have changed. Use the new [logbook](#) to check you meet the new requirements and include a completed new logbook with your application

When you resubmit your application you should check you:

- Ministry of Justice criminal record history is no more than three months old
- First aid certificate is at least two months before expiry date

### Review of site specific CPD requirements


All CoC holders are required to complete annual CPD requirements. The Board and WorkSafe are working on setting the CPD requirements for the newly introduced site specific CoC. Information will be shared as details are confirmed.

### Extension for feedback for MBIE implementation review

MBIE has granted a month-long extension for submissions for the implementation of the Health and Safety at Work (Mining Operations and Quarrying Operations) Regulations 2016 review. Any resulting changes are likely to be agreed mid-2019.

The Board will delay its CoC review until the outcome of the implementation review.

### Summary information on CoC applications

The table below shows this year's competent exam results and cumulative results for all exams held between 16 June and 9 August 2018. It also compares these results to cumulative data for February 2016 to 9 April 2018.

Cumulative results for B grade quarry manager CoCs increased to 69% in 2018, up 2% on the previous year's result of 67%.

Oral exams assess an applicant's ability to respond to workplace situations by using good workplace practice.

Three of the six oral exam resits conducted between 15 June and 9 August , were deemed competent. A CoC applicant is able to resit their oral exam two times.

### Reminders

#### Resit applications

A reminder that if you are submitting an application for a resit you do not need to provide all the documents provided in your original application again.

Applications for a resit should include:

- a new application form
- a completed Fit and Proper form, including a certified copy of a Ministry of Justice criminal records history, if the previous one is more than three months old.
- a certified copy of a first aid certificate if your certificate is due to expire within two months

#### CPD Logbooks

Paper-based CPD logbooks can still be used. Remember to keep all your evidence for formal learning. This will also need to be paper-based.




